

- We're in a climate crisis and it's getting worse
- The climate crisis is a major public health risk
- The COVID-19 pandemic, and other recent outbreaks of novel diseases, are further stark reminders that international travel (especially air travel and cruise ships) pose major public health risks

I'm old enough to remember the days when air travel was the preserve of the military and the very rich. Even now, most of the world's population will never take a flight. But aviation has grown out of control.

The key statistic:

In 1960, 100 million passengers travelled by air. By 2017, the total annual worldwide passenger count was **4 billion**.

Flying Into Trouble: The Size of the Problem

- Aircraft contribute 12 percent of U.S. transportation emissions, and account for three percent of the nation's total greenhouse gas production.
- The combined total contribution of commercial aviation was approximately 5 percent of the world's climate-warming problem in 2018
- By 2050, commercial aircraft emissions could triple given the projected growth of passenger air travel and freight (2018 projection)

Flying Into Trouble: Wellington

Wellington City's headline figures between 2001 and 2018:

- EMISSIONS down 7%
- 🕺 POPULATION up 24%
- ✓ LOCAL GDP up 59%
- ROAD EMISSIONS down 6%
- AIR TRAVEL up 45%
- **WASTE down 32%**

Carbon Offsets – Do Good or Look Good?

One of the main responses by airlines to public concern over aviation emissions have been carbon offset schemes, where passengers pay a bit extra to have e.g. some trees planted to counterbalance the emissions from their flight.

The risk is that these schemes are more about making passengers feel good about themselves, and generating good PR for airlines, than they are about stabilising emissions – let along reducing them.

Even industry-supported bodies such as the Centre for Aviation (CAPA) are doubtful about the accountability of these schemes – especially given the lack of a global standard for such schemes.
